WHAT HOLIDAYS LOOK LIKE AT THE NURSERY

every day at the Nursery is special. But what about holidays? How does the Nursery handle them? Because so many families celebrate differently, we do not recognize any holidays specifically. That's not to say that we don't make days like Thanksgiving or Christmas feel special — we do. We just don't "name" the day.

We talked with our Children's Services Manager Precious Fritz to learn more.

Tell us more about the "why" behind the Nursery's approach to holidays.

The Nursery is an inclusive environment. It's critical that everyone is comfortable in our space, whether it's families, children or staff, and whether it's a holiday or a "regular" day.

How do you handle Christmas at the Nursery?

Instead of celebrating or recognizing Christmas specifically, we focus on the season with fun winter-themed activities and decor. We acknowledge that this is a season of giving, and we want to make gift-giving possible for families who use our services. That's where our Holiday Helper program comes in. (Learn more about Holiday Helpers on page 4.)

Because you don't mention holidays specifically at the Nursery, how do you respond if a child brings up Christmas, Santa, etc.?

If a child initiates the conversation, we listen and acknowledge and talk about it with them. We want to validate and talk about whatever conversations the children bring up. However, we are careful not to include our own personal beliefs or traditions in these conversations.



What about Thanksgiving and other non-religious holidays?

We handle these days just like we handle religious holidays. On Thanksgiving, for example, we may have Fall or harvest-themed decor. Our kitchen manager or Cook for Kids volunteers typically prepare a more traditional Thanksgiving meal (turkey, rolls, stuffing and pie), but we don't identify it as a holiday. For Halloween, we may offer the kids treats or small trinkets and let them dress up in costumes, but we don't call it "Halloween" or acknowledge the holiday.

How do you make sure parents are okay with the festive activities?

Holidays are meant to be joyful, but we know they can also be painful or sad for a variety of reasons. We are very sensitive to this, so if a child is staying with us during a holiday or holiday season, we explain to parents what that looks like at the Nursery. We always want to ensure we're respecting each family's wishes and traditions, so if a parent prefers their child doesn't participate in a certain activity, we always have alternate activities available so no child feels left out.

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Send warm wishes to friends and family while brightening the life of a child.



HOLIDAY CRAFTS: TRY THIS AT HOME!

We do a lot of fun crafts with the kids at the Nursery. Here's a craft idea and a snack you can make with your own kids.

HANDPRINT WREATHS

You will need:

Construction paper or cardstock (green for a holiday wreath or brown, yellow and orange for a Fall wreath) Scissors Glue/glue stick Paper plate Ribbon



Instructions:

- Cut out the inner circle of a paper plate to make a ring.
- Have your kids trace their hand on a piece of cardstock to make a template, and use it to trace several more hands. Cut them out and glue them around the paper plate ring.
- Optional: Cut out red circles to make berries or add ribbon.



BAGEL SNOWMAN FACES

For an adorable, healthy snack that kids can have fun making themselves (or with help from an adult, depending on their age), try making bagel snowman faces!

Instructions:

- Cover a bagel half with white cream cheese, and then use blueberries or raisins for the e yes and smile.
