
The sound of children's laughter is heard often at the Nursery.

Nora loves coming to the Nursery because when she's here she has a very important job...to be a child. She lives in the city with no park or yard nearby so when she visits the Nursery her teachers know how important it is to spend time on the playground.

Do you remember what that feels like? The wind in your hair, grass tickling your skin as you roll down a hill.

Nora smiles when she hears the sound of her little brothers squealing with delight as they celebrate climbing to the top of the slide. **Outdoor play** isn't just a staple of childhood, it's also **crucial to building a healthy foundation**.

Six ways playing outside helps children, from Harvard Medicine:

- 1. Sunshine! Sun exposure and vitamin D play important roles in our bodies. Bone development, healthy sleep, and our moods Our bodies work best when they get some sunshine every day.
- 2. Exercise active play is the best exercise for children
- 3. Executive function these are the skills that help us plan, prioritize, troubleshoot, and multitask; they are crucial for our success. This also includes creativity and using our imagination to problem-solve. To learn and practice these skills, children need unstructured time with other children, and to be allowed to make up their own games, figure things out, and entertain themselves.
- 4. Taking risks children need to take some risks otherwise they won't know what they can do. Trying new things is an important part of life and the lessons we learn from failure are just as important as those we learn from success.
- 5. Socialization unstructured playtime helps children learn how to work together so they can make friends, share and cooperate, and learn how to treat other people.
- 6. Appreciation of nature we only have one planet so let's help our children learn to love it!

CRAFT CORNER: OUTDOOR WATER PAINTING

How do you get small children excited about developing their fine motor skills? Let them draw and paint somewhere they normally don't!

This fun activity will help children be independent in future tasks like getting dressed (buttons and zippers), writing, using utensils to eat, turning pages of a book, brushing their teeth, and putting away toys.

Materials:

- 1. Paintbrush and water
- 2. Somewhere to paint, such as a wooden fence or the sidewalk
- 3. Chalk (optional)

Instructions:

- 1. Dip the paintbrush in water and let your child create!
- 2. Draw letters or numbers with chalk and let older children trace them with their water-dipped paintbrush.
